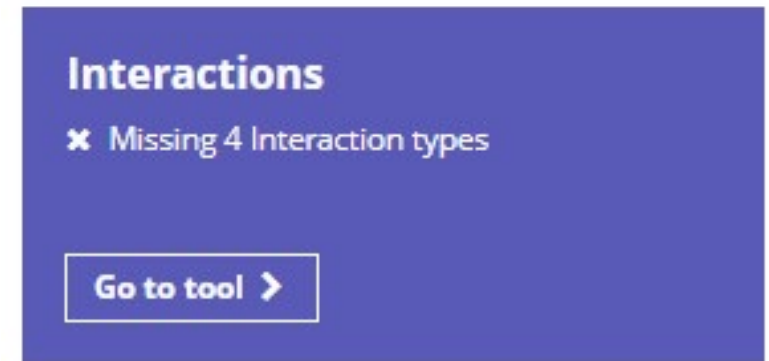

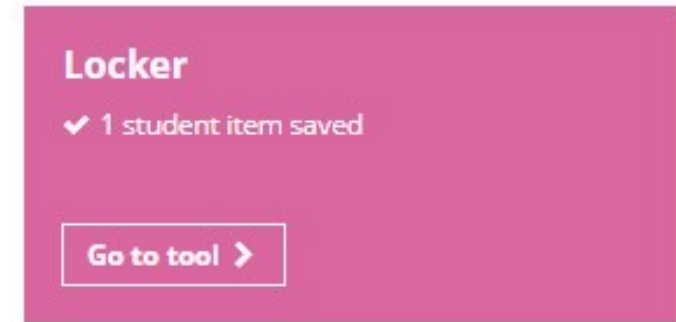
Once you have completed your CV/resumé you can choose to do one or all of the following:
