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# 🏟 Looking Ahead

### **TEAM BALLAKERMEEN** BUILDING A WARM, WELCOMING AND FRIENDLY CULTURE

It is said that manners cost nothing but are worth a lot. At Ballakermeen we really believe in the value of manners and politeness; respect is one of our core values after all!

We know that manners are very well taught at home but sometimes when youngsters arrive in school and meet up with their mates, they can slip up or forget at times. We are going to work on this by explicitly modelling politeness. From January we are going to show students what politeness looks and sounds like at Ballakermeen. We are going to be extra polite to students and expect them to be as polite to us as we are to them.

The politeness that we are talking about is nothing that won't be familiar. As adults in school, we will be routinely saying good morning or good afternoon to students and in return we will simply expect a "Good morning sir" or "Good afternoon miss". Although this may feel a little artificial to begin with, once we have practiced, it will become a positive habit which will then develop into natural positive interactions across the school helping to create a warm, welcoming and friendly atmosphere.

We believe that politeness is important for life and that every interaction with an adult is a possibility for students to practice for job, college or university interviews so that students grow in confidence and have the skills to go anywhere and compete with anyone!

We will be using the acronym, STEPS. Your children may have spoken to you about this. STEPS is simply a memory tool to remind us of the simple actions that demonstrate politeness. The 'S' stands for smile and reminds us of the importance of tone or voice, facial expression, body language and choice of words. TEP stand for thankyou, excuse me and please which we know will have been taught at home, but we want to reinforce in school. The final 'S' stands for our BHS style which is formal for example sir or miss at the end of a sentence.

In short, we are going to focus on politeness and manners in the hundreds of interactions that take place between adults and students every day within Ballakermeen. We hope that you will see and hear about the impact of our positive habits from your children at home.

January marks the start of an exciting and positive journey where we work as a Ballakermeen team, adults and students, to live our values in all that we do. We will work together to create the warmest, most welcoming and friendly school that we can be!
